3. The Imperial Potentate and our Potentate



Every weekend before the start of the Imperial Session, the Potentates and Chief Rabbans have a picture taken with the incoming Imperial Potentate. This is the picture taken on July 8, Saturday, in Daytona, FL of Illustrious Sir Chibu Uson and Imperial Sir Gary Bergenske.

Following is some information about our new Imperial Potentate, Imperial Sir Gary Bergenske.

Imperial Sir Gary was raised a Master Mason in 1994 at Eola Lodge #207 in Orlando and that same year became a member of Bahia Shriners in Orlando, where he is now a lifetime member. He served as Potentate of Bahia in 2005 and is the founder of the Bahia Historical and Educational Museum in Orlando. He is an associate member of Zor Shriners in Madison, Wisconsin and is also a perpetual lifetime member of the Orlando Scottish Rite with the rank of Knight Commander of the Court of Honor. Imperial Sir Gary currently serves as a certified member of the Advisory Council of Florida DeMolay. He has been elected to receive the prestigious DeMolay Honorary Legion of Honor Award and was named an Honorary Member of DeMolay's International Supreme Council by the Grand Master of DeMolay at Imperial Session in 2017. He is an emeritus member of Shriners International, a lifetime member of the Cabiri

International and a member of the Royal Order of Jesters, The Order of Quetzalcoatl, Lions International, and the Loyal Order of Moose.

Imperial Sir Gary served three successful years as Chairman of the Shriners International all-star college football event, the East-West Shrine Game®. During his years as a member of the boards of directors, he has served on numerous committees, including as Chairman of the Public Relations, Fraternal Strategic Planning, Information Services, Insurance, Protocol, and Capital Evaluation Committees. In addition, he has served as the Liaison Officer to the Shriners Hospitals for Children in Erie, Springfield, Houston, Galveston, Portland, Honolulu and Spokane. He served on the Executive Committee of the Imperial Membership Committee for 14 years, and was a charter member of both the TRAC and PACE Teams. He has also been an inspirational keynote speaker and presenter at Imperial conferences for Oriental Guides, Assistant Rabbans, Public Relations, Donor Relations and Membership.

During the time he was a member of the Imperial Membership Executive Committee, Imperial Sir Gary came up with the idea of having a Shriners mascot to not only promote the fraternity but to also attract younger generations, which resulted in the development of Fez Head Fred. While serving as Membership Chairman of Bahia Shriners, he created and developed the Mentor Program to get new members involved. Shriners now use this program throughout the world.

In 1985, Imperial Sir Gary purchased J & J Metro Moving and Storage, which he has owned and operated for the past 30 years. In addition, he is a motivational speaker and has written three books. His books discuss ways to "Build a Better Life" and "Become a Better Leader" and are available in more than 10 countries, where they are making a positive difference in people's lives.

In his down time, Imperial Sir Gary loves traveling, the outdoors, hunting, old cars and Harley-Davidsons. Sir Gary and his wife, First Lady Anne, have six children – Carrie, Lisa, Jason, Jami, David and Jared – and are often referred to as the "Bergy Bunch." They have 11 grandchildren who regularly brighten their days.

Musings of the Recorder.By Noble Mark Fenny, Recorder of Khartum Temple

There has been a lot happening in Khartum World in the past twelve months. I thought this might be a good opportunity to remind people of what we have accomplished.

We are still hamstrung with our financial problems. Focused mainly on our cash flow problems and that of course is caused by fundraising activities which have not met expectations, and the costs associated with maintaining the Shrine Centre, which has been further compounded by an aging and diminishing membership base. The good news is that thanks to the efforts of Ill. Sir Jack Hildebrand PP and Ill. Sir Chibu Uson our variable expenses are lower than they have ever been. I have no trouble suggesting that they are under control. Unnecessary travel, entertainment, personnel and other expenses have been eliminated or severely curtailed.

Last year Ill. Sir Jack Hildebrand saw the writing on the wall, and dragged the Strategic Plan out of the garbage can and with the aid of the Divan and Jimm Simon brought it back to life. In the

fall of 2016 the Strategic Planning Committee agreed that there were four objectives which had to be met if we were going to move forward and there would be any hope of avoiding a financial failure. Ill Sir Chibu and the new Divan jumped on board and we have been making slow but steady progress. The top four priorities are as follows:

- 1. Find a solution to the drag the finances of Khartum has been on the Shrine Centre. To that end the Property Committee has been meeting and reviewing a very long list of options, concluding, that the best option for Khartum was to find a way in which to put together the Masons and Shriners in the same building. There are other options we may pursue as well but that would be our first choice. Ultimately the final recommendation(s) will need to come back to the members for approval.
- 2. We need to find a way to better use technology to reduce expenses and communicate with our members. This goes hand in hand with increasing transparency. To that end we have borrowed a page out of Gizeh's playbook and adopted a software program that will allow the various clubs and individuals to participate in meetings held anywhere in Khartum's jurisdiction. This also means that the participating clubs can vote at these meeting including voting on all motions, including elections. With the help of Noble Allan Cantor the Kronicle has been resurrected in an electronic format, and for the most part eliminating the need for printing and mailing. For those who do not have access to email or the internet, we still print a limited number of copies in house and mail them to those members. Finally, the website has been revamped with the help of Noble Jonathan Cortes and we now have a site which is current and we can use to communicate both internally and externally as well as using it to market Shrine Centre and to sell merchandise (e.g. raffle tickets) online. Members' are now receiving more information than ever before, with minutes of the divan, Unit Council and Stated meetings all being available electronically.
- 3. In order to obtain the support of the Nobility they need to know what is going on. To that end they need to understand what the challenges are that Khartum is facing. We are now communicating financial reports on a regular basis. In addition, thanks to the efforts of Nobles Doug Collins and Wayne Kramble a new and easier to understand financial report has been developed so that even people with a limited background or understanding of financial reporting will be able to see what is happening.
- 4. We need to stabilize, retain and grow our membership. Progress in this area has been limited. It requires the involvement of all members of the Nobility and this just doesn't seem to be happening.

In order to support these and other initiatives we have a number of new committees:

1. Property and Premises.

- 2. Technology and Communications.
- 3. Financial Advisory Committee (to make recommendations regarding the financial challenges facing Khartum and assist with other matters such as budgets).
- 4. Leadership Search Committee (charged with the responsibility of reviewing the skill sets necessary to manage the affairs of Khartum and make appropriate nominations for the elected position on the Divan and to assist the Chief Rabban when with regard to the appointed positions).

The 2018 budgeting and find raising plans are currently under way.

Clearly, we are not where we would like to be, but progress is being made. The elected Divan is assuming the role of a Board of Directors for a not for profit organization and Khartum on the business side is beginning to look more and more like a business.

We are always looking for skilled individuals; BE PART OF THE SOLUTION; volunteer to help out!

Fezzing Ceremony at the Potentate's Ball

REMINDER OF PROCEDURES:

DURING PRAYER:

The FEZ should be removed and held in the right had over the heart.

SALUTE:

The Military Salute is used when reciting the Pledge of Allegiance and during the playing or singing of the National Anthems of Canada, the United States, Mexico, Panama, Philippines or Germany. (If uncovered, come to attention and face the flag. DO NOT salute, place the right hand over the heart.)

SALUTE TO THE FLAG:

A Noble who is wearing his FEZ will execute a right -hand salute when the Colours are within six paces of him, he will not remove his FEZ. After the Colours have passed, he should drop his right hand. In the case where the same Colours pass the same point again, as frequently happens in a Ceremonial procession or in display drills, the Colours need not be saluted a second time. When not wearing a FEZ, the right hand should be held over the heart.

WEARING THE FEZ:

The FEZ must be worn with the emblem directly centered on the head and worn in it's proper shape without crushing, creasing or alteration. ONE FEZ PIN is allowed to hold the tassel in place. Other ornamentation is prohibited.

THE SALAAM:

A Noble addressing the Potentate while he is presiding in the East should always give the Salaam. The Potentate should give the sign of the Order in return. The Salaam is given by the leader of a Uniformed Unit that is performing for the Potentate, and the Potentate give the sign of the Order in return. No other Unit member "Salaams".

SALUTATIONS:

A Potentate or Past Potentate is always addressed as "Illustrious Sir". The prefix "Past" should not be used when addressing a Past Potentate. Members of the Elective Divan should be referred to by the title of their office, or by Noble.

7. **Fundraising:**

Khartum Shrine conducts a number of fundraising events each year. Those Nobles conducting these activities this year were invited to contribute articles about these activities. The following responded:

(a) Shrine ExShuttles at the Red River Exhibition.

During this past year there had been a number of discussions concerning the Shrine assisting the Red River Exhibition (the Ex). Noble Lorne Gregorash had a number of discussions with the CEO of the Ex, Garth Rogerson, who suggested the Shrine could help the Ex with shuttling people from main parking lot to main gate and that the Ex would supply the golf carts. Also, the Ex needed help with the beer gardens. He also requested any Shrine Bands could perform.

There were a total of 27 shuttle shifts to cover, each shift was 3 hours long. There were a total of 51 Nobles, Ladies, family and friends that covered these shifts, some putting in 6 hours, covering two shifts. There were four carts on the go for all shifts and on three days there were five carts.

The Ex supplied all carts, at a cost of \$50/Per cart per day, totaling \$2,150.00. There were seethrough bottles for tips on every cart.

Total tips collected was \$ 4,219.85, plus the Ex provided \$2,000.00 for operating the shuttle. Total \$ 6,219.85 was raised.

We are looking forward to next year and looking after the overflow parking lot as well, which means more spots to fill. We would like to start now looking for advertisers/sponsors who would like to help with the cost of the carts, as we will need more of them.





(b) Christmas Cakes By Noble Gary Sunders

Summer is almost over and I hope all enjoyed doing what you wanted to do. We are now about one month away from the start of our annual Christmas Cake fundraiser. I would like to take this opportunity to thank each of you for your support in past years and trust that Khartum can count on your continued support once again. Following this message are the guidelines for the fundraiser and schedule for distribution of cakes to nobles. If you have any questions in regards to the Christmas Cake fundraiser please contact me at 204 256-0811.

For your information, the sale of Christmas Cakes by the Shrine started in the mid 90's after the onion sales didn't do so well. The cakes are baked by Weston bakery. The recipe is not unique to Shrinedom. In the past years we have ordered 291 cases (3492 cakes) and have sold out, making approximately \$17 000. We have 79 cases dropped off in Dryden, (these go to Kenora 30 cases, Dryden 39 cases, and Sioux Lookout 10 cases).

Geoff Gray is from the University of Manitoba Bison's and played on the West Team as an Offensive Guard. Geoff signed as a priority free agent with the Green Bay Packers. He is the second U of M Bison's player to get an NFL spot in as many years after defensive lineman David Onyemata, who played in the 2016 West Team, signed with the New Orleans Saints last year.

Each year, players and coaches visit the Shriners Hospitals for Children in Tampa, FL during game week to meet the patients and gain a greater understanding of the importance of game. During the inspirational and humbling visit, the teams experience a day they will never forget. Whether dancing to music, playing games or simply sharing stories with one another, the instant friendships that form between the patients and players are a testament to the motto of the Game, "Being more than just a game".

The East-West Shrine Game is the USA's first college all-star football game and was started by the Shriners in 1925. So, for more than 90 years, some of football's greatest athletes and coaches have contributed to the tradition of the East-West Shrine Game. There was a time not so long ago when it appeared that we would not have a Khronicle. But thanks to Noble Allan, a 35 year member of the Ritualistic Unit, unit president in 2008 and 2009, volunteered to take on the role of Editor. So, thank you Allan for the gift of your remarkable talent to ensure the continuation of this all-important publication.

On a more personal note, congratulations to Noble Allan and his lovely Lady Gloria on the celebration of their 60th wedding anniversary which was celebrated on Saturday August 26th in the Synagogue with friends and members of the Shaarey Zedek Congregation. The esteem and high regard that Noble Allan and Lady Gloria are held in was reflected in the near capacity crowd in attendance for this special celebration.

Now I draw your attention to the importance of our annual Fall Ceremonial on Saturday October 28th. In addition to the members of the Divan, the Fall Ceremonial depends on the help and support from the combined help of more than 100 Nobles and Ladies of Khartum.

According to our historian, Ritualistic Noble Ross Johnston, this is a brief history of our Fall Ceremonial. Khartum's first Ceremonial took place at the Lakehead on September 7th, 1963 and the second on October 17th in that year, at the old Winnipeg Auditorium which is now known as the Archives Building.

Hospital ReportBy Noble Don Thomson, P.P.

As of August 31, 2017, Khartum Shriners have provided for 178 patient visits (including 12 new patients) at a cost of about \$138,200.00. I am pleased to say that we did not have to transport any patients back on a medivac as reported last edition.

Of the 178 Patient visits 117 (66%) Twin Cities, 51 (28%) Canada, 6 (3%) Boston and 4 (2%) Philadelphia. The patient visits from each area are: Lakehead Shrine Club 56 (Twin Cities 53 (3 new); Canada 3), Lake of the Woods 4 Canada (2 new), Winnipeg & Area 90 (Twin Cities 52, Canada 34 (5 new), Philadelphia 4), Interlake Shrine Club 6 (Twin Cities 3, Canada 3), Selkirk Shrine Club 3 (Twin Cities 2 Canada 1 (new), Brandon Shrine Club 4 (Twin Cities 4, Canada 1 (new), Pembina Valley 11 (Canada 5, Boston 6) and Dauphin Shrine Club 3 (Twin Cities).

Earlier this year Trish, one of Khartum's patients from the Lakehead Shrine Club area, held a toy drive and donated a mountain of toys (approximately 4,000) to the Twin Cities Hospital for their patients. Unfortunately, there was not a Shriner at the hospital that day to accept these or thank her for the donation.

Another way our patients have assisted Khartum Shrine is by participating in our annual cash calendar. Over the last few years some of our patients (past & present) have been featured in the calendar. The write-ups are opportunities for you to see what you have done to help each of these patients achieve a better quality of life. In 2018 the calendars will feature 4 patient stories.

In May Shriners Hospitals for Children - Canada proudly inaugurated the Air Canada Foundation's Patient Lounge. The lounge located, next to the main waiting room, is designed to reduce stress for the patients during waiting time before, during or after a medical appointment. The space will also help ease the pressure on parents who often have to travel with the patient's brothers and sisters for an appointment. The lounge is a family-oriented space equipped with two Starlight Foundation gaming consoles, toys, games and activities geared to different ages. The playroom is supervised by child care specialists and volunteers, who provide a safe and fun environment for ambulatory patients.

At the inauguration, the Air Canada Foundation and the hospital launched "Wings of Courage," a new program that will start in September. Air Canada pilots will participate in activities with children and present them with certificates and medals in recognition of their bravery in their fight against illness.

22. Musing of Noble Archie

Musings by Noble Archie Davidson (who requested anonymity, but the choice, Archie, was publish or anonymity and I chose publish)

"...Grow old along with me-the best is yet to be..."-Browning



Today's realities of life demand we as "old timers" change our right attitudes and adjust to this modern age. Let us indulge in some reminiscing. My memory of <u>transportation</u> in the early 30's was street cars running on rails, serviced by overhead cables and two trolley arms. At certain intersections, overhead power connections were complicated and the trolley would often skip-off the power line. The car would immediate stop and the driver would climb out of his compartment, walk out to the rear of the car and attempt to re-engage the trolley arm otherwise we would be stranded. The regular passengers knew of these sensitive street intersections and breathed a sigh of relief whenever we successfully passed these connection points without incident.

My memory also recalls streetcars with coal-fired mini stove at the rear, attended by a second conductor and all passengers had to exit via the rear doors. Seating facilities consisted of long heavily thatched benches running the length of the car and accompanied by a hanging hand-grip to accommodate overflow passengers who had to stand during their trip.

The street car driver had to remain standing and operated his car by a straight arm handle (no steering wheel). Across the full width of the car, along the front bottom was a protruding "cow catcher". This was intended to be a safety net in the event of an unfortunate collision with a misguided animal or human being. It did happen!

Also mounted at the car front was an exterior clapper bell operated inside by a floor mounted pedal (equivalent to our auto horn alarm). This bell would issue an extremely audible "clang" which was a disturbing distraction to all pedestrians in the vicinity but was effective as an equivalent to today's auto horn.

Entry/exit of the car consisted of a single steel step which simply "flopped" when the car door opened and was extremely hazardous for the young and elderly passengers to step up/down particularly in winter.

Cost (in the early 30's) was two tickets for 15 cents. If a booklet was purchased, a bonus of one free ticket was included. If your destination required an interconnection, you requested a transfer (similar to today).

Editor's Note: The picture is that of a streetcar in Regina, where the Editor grew up and where among other things, he flattened coins by allowing the streetcar to run over them, and on Halloween pranked the streetcar driver by pulling off the trolley when it stopped.

23. Registered Disability Savings Plan

A Registered Disability Savings Plan (RDSP) is a savings plan that is intended to help disabled Individuals save for their long-term financial-security.

To qualify for an RDSP the beneficiary (the plan holder) must be eligible for the Disability tax credit (DTC).

The RDSP Is available for both children and adults. Contributions can be made until the end of the year the beneficiary turns SQ. Individuals can contribute up to \$200,000 in a life-time. Anyone can contribute on' behalf of the beneficiary, with the written permission of the plan holder.

Contributions are not tax deductible but are entitled to the Canada disability savings grant.

The government of Canada will pay a matching Canada disability savings grant up to 300% to a maximum of \$3,500 per year and a total of \$70.000 over a lifetime (on contributions made before December 31 of the year the plan holder turns 49). depending on the beneficiary's family income.

A beneficiary. with low family income, may also be eligible for a Canada disability saving bond, Low-Income individuals do not have to make contributions of their own to receive a Canada disability savings bond.

Payments known as disability. assistance payments (DAP's), must commence in the year the beneficiary turns 60. Contributions to RDSPs are not taxed upon withdrawal. Government grants and bonds, and income from the investments, however, will be taxed in the hands of the beneficiary in the year they are received.
