Seems as though it was just the day before yesterday that I submitted my last report.

It has been a busy time for the Hospital Programme, but we are still plodding along and getting things done.

At the time of writing this report, which is early June, we have had almost 100 patient visits to our "Temples of Mercy" at a cost of about \$40,000.00.

By the time this edition of the Khronicle is in your hands the Shrine Patient Transportation Fund raffle is well underway, in fact, we will only have less than a couple of months to go before the final draw on Thursday September 30th, 2010 at noon in Shrine House.

If you haven't got your ticket yet you may lose out on a chance to win either a travel voucher for four people to travel anywhere that Westjet flies on their scheduled routes , (barring blackout periods), all taxes included, or as a second prize a voucher for two people. Not only that, if you sell the winning first prize ticket, you would be the recipient of \$250.00 cash. Not bad for a couple of bucks investment.

Besides the Units and Clubs all doing their part in the sales, we have had a tremendous response from our Patient families in taking books of tickets and selling them.

Besides putting a few dollars into the Transportation Fund we are getting a lot of attention in Public Relations.

A big thanks to Westjet Airlines for providing Khartum Shrine Transportation Fund with these prizes at no cost, and also for their continuing help in transporting our patients and families to our Hospitals whenever required.

Regarding one of our Chicago patients, Afzal, he was in Chicago Spinal Chord Injuries Unit for a period of six weeks, working out on the

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new \$400.000.00 machine as his Physio treatment, but I also understand that he was used for demonstration of the Unit to other parties.

I can recall a couple of years ago when he had his accident that left him

paralyzed, he told his father that he would walk again, and with all the therapy that Shriners Hospitals for Children are offering to him, there is more than a glimmer of hope there.

Report on Seminar at Shriners Hospitals for Children, Canada. Montreal.

Wednesday May 19th, to Friday May 21st, 2010.

After making a few rounds of the hospital discussing generalities for patient and Shrine business, I spoke at length with Mario Rinaldi, who is the nurse care coordinator and patient applications person, on who and when we would be having the next satellite clinic in Winnipeg.

As to which patients would be there, the patient families would be contacted to ensure availability

As to when this clinic would take place I would require to discuss this with Doctor Francois Fassier, Chief of Staff, regarding time and date to suit all concerned, which I would attend to the next day.

I also spoke about three Khartum patients, two of whom had been rejected as candidates for treatment and another who had to have a special operation . Again I would discuss these with Dr Fassier.

In talking with Kathleen Montpetit, Head of Physical and Occupational Therapy department and Coordinator of Clinical Outcomes projects, that one of our long time patients would be front and foremost throughout the Seminar. (I had to wait until Friday to find out more about this)

On Thursday I attended a couple of committee meetings, the first being the public relations committee meeting, where we were informed that there were special certificates that can be had for those who have done something for the Hospital and as recommended by the Potentate of the Shrine Centre, and after which, is approved by the Hospital Board.

There was an indication that the video of the Canadian hospital will be sent to the various Quebec cinemas for inclusion in their pre show commercials.

The Canadian hospital will have a booth at the imperial session in Toronto in July, and the featured patient in the Hospital session will be one from the Canadian Hospital. Which patient and Shrine Centre we were not advised as this will be kept secret until the day of the function.

Shrine Centres were urged to make use of the "Shriners Corner" on the last page of the magazine, Orthopedik, which is published quarterly from the

Hospital. Khartum were featured there at the opening of the Satellite Clinic.

There was some new promotional material given out in the form of referral cards, unfortunately, they request the family to call the hospital direct who direct the patient to call the Shrine Centre, however, there is a place on the card to write in Khartum Shrine Hospital Programme telephone number.

Following this meeting I attended an applications and transportation committee meeting which dealt with driver's policy relating to the van drivers who pick up the patients and families at the airport or hotel for their visits to our "temples of mercy".

This was just a general review of the "do's" and "don'ts" that drivers have to observe while performing these tasks.

Canadian applications , which includes some of the neighbouring U.S. States, approved for the month of April was 403, and new applications from foreign patients for the same period of time was one.

When we discussed transportation from the various Shrine Centres, the Maritime group expressed concern over the cost of their transportation budget. I reiterated the fact that in some cases there could be a saving by using Westjet Airlines, a fact that I had indicated at the last two seminars, but to no avail. Both WAWA and Khartum had saved quite a considerable amount by using Westjet, but even though the Westjet flights are not available to all the Maritime airports, the ones that they could use would show that a substantial saving could be made.

I think I have finally got through to them and have been in correspondence with Philae, Mazol and Luxor Shrine Centres as to their requirements and will pass this information on to Westjet in Calgary with a view to providing these Shrine Centres with some considerations for their transportation costs.

I even got Al Azhar Shrine centre of Calgary interested.

We noted that Karnak Shriners Greeters unit were quite busy this year in transporting patients and families to and from the airport, also to and from the hotels to the hospital which accounts for quite a saving to all the Shrine Centres who use this facility .

The average cost of running the vans to provide this service is around \$1200.00 per month.

The child seats that are supplied for these van trips are outdated and require to be renewed, I have requested an idea of the cost of these seats with the thoughts of contributing some monies to obtain some more.

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We learned that Dr Fassier, Chief of Staff will be stepping down as Chief but will still remain on the Medical Staff, also the hospital will be looking for a replacement for Dr Glorieux in the Research department. Both these doctors have been invaluable in their contributions to Shriners Hospitals for Children and to the world of medicine.

At the board meeting in the afternoon it was the usual round of reports being presented and introduction of the new board chairman Dr Robert Drummond M.D.

We learned that there had been a favourable meeting that morning between McGill University, the Hospital and Imperial Sir Jerry Gantt., with a provisional design being put forward, but there is still a lot of items to be covered yet before the official go ahead.

We had dinner at the top of Place Villa Marie, from which we were able to view the whole city of Montreal and in particular the Shriners Hospital for Children, Canada and also the new site in the Glen Yards.

Returning to our hotel was quite an experience, our taxi mingled with the overjoyed fans of the Habs and with streets being blocked off by the police, we had to walk about five blocks to our hotel, but with all the police around (in full riot gear) we felt a little more comfortable.

Friday morning the Seminar for real began, and after the welcome by the Administrator we heard reports from Imperial Sir Jerry Gantt, who is the Imperial liaison officer to the Hospital, Dr Drummond M.D., the Chairman of the Board , we met a parent who along with her son who had been treated for club feet, shared their experiences at Shriners Hospitals for Children.

Following, various members of the staff gave us addresses of their various programmes called "Reaching for the Children" and as I mentioned earlier in my report when I talked with Kathleen Monpetit, this is where Khartum patient, Matthew, came on the scene.

The title of the theme was "Matthew's experience with Shriners Hospitals" and throughout the various processes such as patient application, transportation, rehabilitation, family resources and camping, Matthew was interjected in all theses phases, and throughout the Seminar his name was brought into the various subjects as being part of the process.

We heard from Dr Glorieux on the research programme and how we had to get back into the top field in this area, also from members

of Dr Glorieux's team on protein, fracture repair distraction osteogenesis, and molecular diagnosis.

The usual group photograph was taken and after lunch, I skipped the Hospital tour, which I have taken often, and slipped up to the Montreal Childrens Hospital to see two of Khartum's patients who had undergone surgery there. Both boys were doing fine and had successful surgeries. Needless to say that the parents were pleased that the time was taken to visit them. Both boys came home shortly thereafter and one of them has since gone back for some more surgery.

After lunch there was a talk on Pediatric Spinal Chord Injury surgery, which at the moment is in its' infancy at Shriners Hospital in Montreal, but progress is being made.

It was especially interesting since we have two Spinal Chord Injury patients attending Chicago at the moment.

We were shown some information on promotional items for sale and for which was provided a copy of their brochure and prices.

Dr Fassier M.D. Chief of Staff, finished that part of the session with an overview of the Orthopeadic programs and more, and a letter was passed out from Matthew's family expressing their thanks to the Shriners and Shriners Hospital for Children, Canada staff for all they had done for Matthew in the eleven years he has been coming Montreal.


A film was then put on the screen, showing the eleven years of trials and tribulations of Matthew on his visits to Montreal and at his home, I have requested that they send me a copy of that film soon and will show it to the nobility at the earliest opportunity. It is well worth watching and should give the nobility that sense of pride of being a Shriner and what can be done for children who are physically challenged.

A few short film excerpts were also shown of the opening of the Paralympics in Vancouver earlier this year showing a dancer, who had no legs of his own but was able to perform the various maneuvers and finally stand on his two artificial legs as the finale. We saw this same person perform on our visit last year, and Dr Fassier was very proud to note that he was one of his patients and the results are just outstanding. The Seminar ended with a patient story from a mother and son and how they persevered at Shriners Hospitals for Children.

Our return to Montreal airport was uneventful for the first half of the journey, but we experienced what it is like to ride a NASCAR at the Indianapolis 500 on the latter half, courtesy of our taxi driver.

In a later conference call I learned that there had been some action on the new hospital at Glen Yards. Some plans had been shown consisting of a 158,000 square foot building with 4 operating rooms, 4 ICU beds and 18 regular beds, and there would be various areas for Physio and Occupational therapy etc. complete with a link to Montreal Childrens Hospital.

There would also be a 25,000 square foot area set aside for research work, which in view of the fact that Tampa was cutting back on this with a reduction in funding around 25%, which moneywise amounted to approximately \$300,000.00., fortunately donations had been received for about \$165,000.00 so



the quality of research conducted at Montreal was not totally impaired, and the news that Tampa was taking another look at research was favourable. There would be a new focus on research at Shriners Hospitals for Children, Canada.

As far as the affiliation with the University of Montreal Hospital, this is on the back burner at the moment due to a new executive being installed in the establishment and "it's start all over" time again.

I also learned that the replacement for Dr Fassier Chief of Staff would probably be decided by the beginning of August, and it looks like an internal replacement.


The yound girl, Sisfriani, from Indonesia has finally arrived in Galveston Texas, and at the time of writing, is attending Shriners Hospitals for Children there for treatment of her burns injuries. It has been a long haul due to the Galveston unit being closed because of the damage done by hurricane Ike.

The flight that took them from Jakarta to Singapore, Moscow and Houston, lasted 35 hours, but on the telephone with Margot, their sponsor from Indonesia, it was all worth it, and they were met at Houston Airport by Galveston Shriners and transported to Galveston.

Margot told me that when they went to Galveston Hospital, the various Hospital staff could not have been any nicer, and the family felt immediate comfort and with no concerns about their visit to Galveston.

Way to go Galveston, a tip of the FEZ to you all. The first visit to see the Doctor at Galveston Hospital






Komedians










Oriental Band

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

In the meantime we wish all of the units a very enjoyable summer of Shrine activities.




